### Phase 1 of the Adam Spach Rock House Park Has Launched!



With much excitement, members of the Wachovia Historical Society watched this past March as the heavy equipment needed to clear the 6.27 acre Adam Spach Rock House site *(pictured below)* commenced clearing the undergrowth and dead trees from the site, making way for the upcoming archaeological study on the site.

Since 1917, the WHS has discussed plans for a park at the site, but these plans were detained for un-



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derstandable priorities by the Depression, then WWII, then the restoration of Old Salem in the 4 decades following the mid 1950's. But as encroaching development has taken place surrounding the park, the WHS Board committed itself anew to making the Adam Spach Historic Park a reality.

In a time when preserving natural spaces in the midst of living spaces is paramount, the park also will provide the element of recreation and green space needed in every growing community. Most importantly, the treasured history of our area will also be preserved, giving food for thought to younger generations of the toil and sacrifice exhibited in settling and surviving in the backcountry of North Carolina in the 1700's.



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Nearly half of the \$40,000 for the first phase of the project has been raised. We are grateful for the members who have contributed to the Adam Spach Rock House Fund, and we encourage you all to have a part in this momentous time in our history.

# from the President "The Lucy Patterson Exhibit"

Wachovia Historical Society has the great privilege in March and April of 2022 of joining with the Winston-Salem Forsyth County Central Library, the local chapter of the DAR, Salem College and Academy and the Daniel Boone Footsteps organization in honoring a Winston-Salem icon, Ms. Lucy Bramlette Patterson (pictured below).

Lucy Patterson (8/22/1865—6/20/1942), for whom Patterson Avenue in Winston-Salem is named, was born in Tazewell, Tennessee, one of two daughters of Col. William Houston and Cornelia Graham Patterson. Her grandfather, Maj. General Robert Patterson, who resided in Philadelphia, served in the War of 1812, the Mexican-American War, and the Civil War. After his passing, his mansion in Philadelphia was purchased to headquarter the Historical Society of Pennsylvania.





Lucy graduated from Salem College as did her mother and while there, she met her future husband who was also a Patterson—Jesse Lindsay Patterson. Jesse or "Lindsay" as he was called, graduated from Davidson College in 1878 and was admitted into the North Carolina Bar in 1881. The merger of the Patterson-Patterson families became a moving force in Winston-Salem and across the state. Lindsay had been born into the union of Rufus Lenoir Patterson and Mary Morehead, daughter of Governor John Motley Morehead. As a prominent Winston-Salem family involved in textile mills and other business interests and local and state politics, the Rufus Pattersons had paved the way for their son and daughter-in-law to be among the most influential families in Winston -Salem at the turn of the century. But it was Lucy that took a leadership role early on. She began writing for the Progressive Farmer as well as the Charlotte Observer and authored a column in the Journal -Sentinel entitled "Just One Another".

Common themes in her articles were business, politics, arts, and sciences. She established an annual award in Continued from page 5 1905 for literary achievement in North Carolina called the Patterson Memorial Cup. The cup was later renamed

the "Mayflower Cup" and is still given today. Lucy traveled extensively, recording her experiences. She met with Queen Maria and her family in Romania and was recognized by King Alexander of Yugoslavia for her accomplishments in Serbia. She was also honored as part of Kola Sestera, a group that helped with wartime relief and orphans during WWI.



More locally, Lucy Patterson helped to found the first DAR chapter in Winston-Salem and served as its first Regent, moving on to be elected as Vice-President General. She was the president of the Southern Women's Interstate Association of the Betterment of Public Schools, was chairman of the Interstate Daniel Boone trail that ran through Tennessee to Kentucky, and in 1902 helped to found the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs, serving as President.

Within all of her other activities, Lucy found time to devote herself also to the Wachovia Historical Society, serving as one of its Vice-Presidents from 1904 to 1919. In 1907, she organized the North Carolina Exhibit for the Jamestown, VA, Ter-Centennial Exposition celebrating the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first surviving English colony in America. Twelve states entered exhibits into the "Palace of Historic Arts." The Wachovia Historical Society sent 43 objects including a framed Proclamation by Governor Tryon. Brad Rauschenberg's History of the Wachovia Historical Society states the following: "The collection was installed by Mr. Julius A Lineback with the care and system for which the Moravians are noted, and embraced the following classes: light, heat, water, household tools and manufactures, earthenware, firearms, literature, maps, etc., music, scientific and professional, historic relics, sundries." The WHS Exhibition won a Silver Award and placed the Wachovia Historical Society into national status among historical societies with unique collections.

The Lucy Patterson Exhibition can be viewed at the Winston-Salem Forsyth County Central Library during the months of March and April on the second floor lobby area. **\***WT

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




### 2022 Annual Meeting—Oct. 18

Mark your calendars now for the 127<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Wachovia Historical Society! The Annual Meeting will be held on the evening of **Tuesday**, **October 18**, **2022**, at the **Old Salem Visitor Center**. The event gets started with a reception at 7:00 p.m. featuring special music, light refreshments, and pleasant conversation among Society members and attendees. Attendees will be treated to an invocation, remarks from the Society president, a report from the nominating committee, the annual oration, and the presentation of the 2022 Archie K. Davis Award.

Our guest speaker for the evening will be Mr. Michael C. Hardy, whose topic is "In the Footsteps of Bishop Spangenberg." Bishop Augustus Spangenberg had seen a good deal of the world before arriving in North Carolina. Born in Germany, he attended Jena University, lived in London, and had worked with churches in the colonies of Georgia and Pennsylvania. Beginning in August 1752, he surveyed western North Carolina for the site of a new mission. Spangenberg recommended a tract of land in the Yadkin River Valley, and the property (known as Wachovia) was purchased. We are fortunate to welcome a speaker of the caliber of Mr. Hardy, who has a passion for history. Over the past three decades, he has written about people, places, and events which are frequently overlooked in the grand,



sweeping narratives. He is the author of twenty-four books. His articles have appeared in numerous national magazines, and he has been featured as a commentator in the recent *Blood and Fury: America's Civil War* on the American Heroes Channel and on Civil War Talk Radio. In 2010, Michael was named the North Carolina Historian of the Year by the North Carolina Society of Historians, and in 2018, *General Lee's Immortals*, his history of the Branch-Lane brigade, was honored with the James I. traditional musical prelude was provided by Glenn Siebert, *tenor*, and Robert Rocco, *piano*, both professors at the UNC School of the Arts. WHS President Michelle DeLapp reviewed the current status of the Society and outlined the key priorities of WHS in the year ahead. The Annual Oration was provided by Johanna Metzgar Brown *(at right)*, Curator of Moravian Decorative Arts at Old Salem Museums & Gardens. Mrs. Brown's oration was entitled *"a place of peace and a dwelling of blessing:* 



The Early History and Material Culture of the Salem Girls' Boarding School," prepared in recognition and celebration of the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Salem Academy and College. Mrs. Brown's address was superb; we could have listened to her for hours; and her presentation was replete with historical stories and snippets, with expertly selected pictures of scenes, buildings, and art, familiar to those of us intimately acquainted with Wachovia and the historic school. Evva and Travis Hanes Receive 2021 Archie K. Davis Award

Last October 19, the Wachovia Historical Society was pleased to present the 2021 Archie K. Davis Award to Evva and Travis Hanes, the wellknown proprietors of Mrs. Hanes' Cookies. Here is the text of the award presentation, which was delivered by Mo and Martha Hartley, winners of the 2011 Archie K. Davis Award.

It is a great honor to introduce this year's Archie K. Davis Award for contributions to the knowledge and appreciation of Moravian history. Let's begin...

Herrnhut has the Moravian Star Factory, and we have Mrs. Hanes' Moravian Cookies – what great evangelism! The hands behind "Mrs. Hanes' Hand-Made Moravian Cookies" are the founders, Evva and Travis Hanes. For over 60 years, this power couple has made a significant contribution to the knowledge and appreciation of Moravian history through the deep sensory experience of their handmade Moravian cookies. Mrs. Hanes' Cookies are "Moravian ambassadors" like no other, sending Moravian history across the globe by the paper-thin millions. Evva and Travis' lifetime has been devoted to building an important and successful local business, with broad outreach, based on Moravian history and tradition. Evva and Travis Hanes are deeply rooted in Wachovia through their Moravian ancestry and are active members of Friedberg Moravian Church. Both descend from Adam and Maria Spach, founders of Friedberg. The "cookie factory" is located on Evva's family farmland along Friedberg Church Road, just south of the Adam Spach Rock House site, the significant property of the Wachovia Historical Society. Mrs. Hanes' Cookies is a family business that grew out of Evva's mother's Christmas time enterprise of supplementing income from their small dairy farm with Moravian cookies. Her mother, Bertha Crouch Foltz, baked old family-recipe Moravian cookies with Evva by her side. In 1960, Evva took over all the baking when her mother's health failed. The business grew by word of mouth, and the first bakery building was constructed in 1970.

Travis and Evva have overseen seven expansions, and the cookie factory is now more than 30,000 square feet of manufacturing, warehouse, and office space.

A large parking area for customers is outside. Annual production at Mrs. Hanes' Cookies is approximately 10 million cookies, each carrying the Moravian story. Sales include 90,000 customers: retail at the cookie factory and

mail-order to all 50 states and 30 countries abroad. The cookie factory bakes year-round, and Mrs. Hanes' Cookies are the only Moravian cookies to be completely produced by hand. The retail area of the cookie factory includes photographs, newspaper & magazine stories, various artifacts, and items of interest. Travis Hanes' signature walking sticks are hand-crafted works of art. The retail area also features the production process. Large plate glass walls line the room and provide viewing for each step of cookie making. The production process is mesmerizing as the "Artists in Aprons" deftly rollout the dough into paper-thinness on their custom-built angled rolling boards. In flashing speed, they cut the dough with tin cookie cutters and lay each cookie precisely on to cookie sheets. The cookie sheets go into large ovens at the back of the room, and the pans emerge with perfectly baked Moravian cookies. They cool and are then packed into tins and tubes, all by careful hands.

Mrs. Hanes' Cookie Factory is a significant employer of women in the Forsyth/Davidson county area. Evva is a seventh-generation Moravian cookie maker and has trained all to the art of the Moravian an cookie tradition. Mrs. Hanes' Moravian Cookie Factory is also a unique tourist destination for locals, visitors, and travel & food writers. Visits are so popular that scheduled tours are available to school groups and community organizations. In the Moravian tradition, Mrs. Hanes' Hand-Made Moravian Cookies is a family business built on excellence of quality and customer service. Evva and Travis's children, Mona Hanes Templin and Mike Hanes, have followed their parents in the management of Mrs. Hanes' Cookies, with the next generation coming along.

Evva and Travis continue to live in their home up the hill from the cookie factory and provide the support and wisdom of their experience. They also regularly host family and friends for home cooked

meals. As a matter of fact, the 2019 NC General Assembly passed legislation making the Moravian Cookie the State Cookie of North Carolina! In part, the bill said, "it is fitting to recognize the positive impact the Moravians have had on the state's culture," and also cited the heritage of the Moravian community and the cookies, as well as the economic and tourism impact of Moravian cookie sales in the Winston-Salem area since the 1950s.


Like Mr. Archie K. Davis, Evva and Travis Hanes' "contribution and devotion to the history of our region, state, and nation has enriched the apprecia-

The General Funds designated amount for \$10,000 resulted from a grant application to the Marion S. Covington Foundation awarded during November 2021 for the Adam Spach Rock House Archaeological Study, Phase I. Disbursements for the Society are primarily grant requests approved by its board of directors along with expenses related to printing and mailing **The Wachovia Tract**, website design, hosting and management, the Annual Meeting including the Archie K. Davis Award for History and Christmas greenery in Old Salem. **Total receipts for the period January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021 were \$20,058 and disbursement were \$19,228**, with no grants disbursed. Once again, many thanks for your membership giving. As can be noted from articles in this and previous issues of **The Wachovia Tract**, my belief is we have been excellent stewards of your interest and support. **\***WT
