Foltz heirs have made a special gift to the Society in the form of the copyright to the book "Adam and Maria Spach, Their Family" a chronical of the descendants of Adam Spach from the first generation in 1753 with the birth of their first son, Johann Adam Spach, down to the current generation. In addition to the copyright, the

Herman Foltz heirs, Susan L. Foltz and Lynne Foltz Bostick have donated 28 of the remaining numbered First Edition copies of the book to the Society. The book, comprised of 1,002 pages, also contains pictures of some of the descendants as early as the third generation and other important historical information of

the settlement of the Friedberg area. The book comprises 1,002 pages and is an invaluable research tool for a family that was instrumental in the progress of the early Moravian settlements of Wachovia.

Herman Foltz spent the remaining 30 years of his life travelling all over the country gathering genealogies, pictures information in the day before computers came onto the scene for research. The book was published in 1999 and the following year Mr. Foltz passed away. Wachovia Historical Society, Inc. expresses its deepest appreciation for the gift of this work which will be used by researchers and family members alike for generations to come.

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"Preserving Wachovia: 'There is none like it"

"There is none like it" was Frederick William Marshall's description of the 100,000-acre Moravian tract of Wachovia for his 1768 report on the Brethren's new colony in North Carolina. Wachovia is unparalleled in American history and endures in the culture, land scape, and people today. Since The Wachovia Study was launched in 1987 by M.O. and Martha Hartley, they have devoted their professional careers to the preservation of the history, place, and people of Wachovia. The Wachovia Historical Society has supported a number of their projects. From protecting Bethania from an expressway corridor to recognition of African American history in Salem, preserving Wachovia continues to challenge. This illustrated lecture will present highlights from the Hartley's experience preserving Wachovia.


Martha Hartley is Director of Moravian Research and Co-Chair of the Hidden Town Project at Old Salem Museums & Gardens. A native of Winston-Salem, she received undergraduate degrees from Hollins College and spent a year in Paris during college. From the University of Virginia, she received a master's degree in Urban Planning and a Certificate in Historic Preservation.

She is a Preservation Planner with varied experience including community preservation, advocacy, and public awareness. For over 35 years, Martha and her husband Michael, anthropologist and Emeritus Director of

Archaeology at Old Salem, have forged award winning careers in their work with the archaeology, history, landscape, and preservation of Moravian communities in the Winston Salem area.

WHS Board Members explore Spach Rock House site

Several years ago, the cornerstone of Adam & Maria Spach's 1764 stone dwelling was uncovered after having been misplaced for several decades. Cornerstones of historic buildings are captivating not just because they are the "first stone" of a building, but because of the history of the people who touched that stone and laid that stone in its place to begin a new structure. In the case of the Adam and Maria Spach rock house, who was the person that laid the cornerstone, and who were those who placed the remaining massive stones, one on top of another, perfectly fitting them into place without mortar until a perfectly square and plumbed structure was formed? We will never know the full answer to that question and that is unfortunate that no account was left to answer the question.

Organizations have their cornerstones as well. As a new chapter opens in the history of an organization, each person who participates in building a new idea or concept or places their resources challenging others to do the same becomes a cornerstone. Recently, Anne Lantry, the owner of the Zeveley House Inn, stepped forward to become one of WHS's cornerstones by a gift of \$5,000 toward the Adam and Marie Spach Historical Park fund. July 4, 2023,

All Wachovia Historical Society members were invited to bring picnic baskets to Salem Square's shady, pleasant setting. WHS will set up a reserved picnic area to renew acquaintances made throughout the year. Bring an extra dessert for a "sweet swap" as we enjoy our WHS Fellowship. At 7:30 p.m., the Salem Band will play your



favorite patriotic songs, marches, and big band tunes to complete this unique Fourth of July celebration.

August 6, 2023, A Conversation with Mary Tribble

Mary Tribble opened the doors to her home in Old Salem for an opportunity to meet Mary's ancestral grandmother, Sally Merriman Wait. Sally Wait is a significant figure in North Carolina history, and her decision to move to North Carolina ultimately led to the founding of Wake Forest University. Mary shared researching Sally Wait's life, a love that eventually led to her writing her first book, Pious Ambitions. Mary shared family heirlooms that told the unique stories of Sally Wait's life and how she used archival references. These stories were adventures in themselves and were enriched by her guest Tanya-Zanish-Belcher, head of Archives at Wake Forest University. Mary's tour of her home included the 1950s bomb shelter. This event was genuinely entertaining and informative.

September 3, 2023, The Peter Oliver Legacy

Peter Oliver is one of the main characters in Salem's history. One of the few black artisans trained by Moravian Masters, Peter was a talented and unusual figure. As an enslaved person who earned his Freedman's status, Peter's life gives incomparable insight into the ambiguities of a complex era. Presenter Johanna Brown, director of collections and curator of Moravian Decorative Arts, began the presentation with an overview of the Salem potters and their works. Martha Hartley, Director of Moravian Research, then led the group on a walk through Salem with an overview of Peter Oliver's life, a visit to his grave, and those of his children. The group then stopped by Lot 38 to discuss archaeological finds at pottery sites in Salem. Christine Williams, Board Chair of Creative Corridors Coalition, then gave an overview of plans for the Peter Oliver Pavillion, a gateway museum connecting Winston-Salem with Saem. This event, hosted by Amy Taylor North, finished with one of the most delightful home tours. Amy's home, the Shaffner House, is one, like Peter Oliver's life, that connects the dots from the 1700s to today.

Moravian Pottery in the Old Salem and Wachovia Historical Society Collections

Together the Wachovia Historical Society and Old Salem Museums & Gardens are the guardians of the most significant collection of Moravian pottery in the United States.

The progenitor of the Moravian pottery tradition in North Carolina was Gottfried Aust, who apprenticed in Herrnhut, Germany, worked briefly in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, and served as master in Bethabara, North Carolina, from 1756 to 1771 and in Salem from 1771 to 1788. His work and that of the many potters he trained encompassed an astonishing range of ware including slip-decorated dishes, British-style creamware, faience, and sculptural bottle forms.

Several of the pottery lines developed by the Moravians were purely commercial, but eighteenth and early nineteenth century slip-decorated dishes had deep symbolic meaning within the Moravian communities.

Most of the slip-decorated dishes associated with Aust and his successors have naturalistic plants in their centers, likening them to flower paintings in clay.

The most frequently depicted flowers on Moravian dishes are anemones, which often appear in conjunction with lilies of the valley. Christians have long associated anemones with Christ's crucifixion, believing them to be the flowers that sprung from the ground as the blood flowed from his wounds. Anemones held special significance for Moravians, who focused on Christ's blood and wounds more than other Protestant sects.

Compelling evidence for the symbolic importance of anemones in Moravian art can be found in artist John Valentine Haidt's Cornelius Foreseeing his Christianity. The painting, which was probably owned by "Aust dug clay and made pottery, for which the people were eager; he also began to make clay pipes." (Wachovia Diary, 1 December 1755).

one of the Moravian congregations in North Carolina, depicts the Roman centurion Cornelius, who is considered to be the first Gentile converted to Christianity, and Mary holding the Christ child. Below the hem of Mary's robe are two white anemones draped over a book that represents the New Testament. In this context, the flowers represent the death of Christ to come rather than his crucifixion so they are white rather than red. Aust and his successors used strikingly similar floral compositions on their slipware dishes.

As a flower that blooms early in the spring, the lily symbolizes both the resurrection of Christ and each believer's relationship to him as in the marriage metaphor that was pervasive in early Moravian theology.

In addition to the wheel thrown wares Moravian potters in North Carolina made press-molded earthenware for more than one hundred and twenty-five years. The range of forms documented by surviving objects, molds, and references in pottery inventories is far greater than that of any contemporary American ceramic tradition.

From smoking pipes to stove tiles, the Moravian potters at Bethabara and Salem expanded the production of press-molded earthenware to include figural bottles and casters, non-figural bottles, and toys. Rudolph Christ can be credited for the successful production and marketing of press-molded wares during his tenure as master of the potteries at Bethabara (1786–1789) and Salem (1789–1821). The Wachovia Historical Society collection includes a large number of the original molds used to make these delightful objects.

The next time you visit Old Salem Museums & Gardens, be sure to come by the Dianne H. Furr Moravian Decorative Arts Gallery where you can see many of these wonderful objects on exhibit!

A Fresh Blend of Old and New

It all began over a drink. Two Moravian pastors, a lawyer, a graphic designer, a meat processor, and a Presbyterian were dreaming about ways to breathe new life into the Covid quiet streets of Old Salem.

The big idea was community. How does one create a welcoming space for people to gather and connect to one another? It did not take long for this rag tag group to conceive of a coffee house and tap room. In the 21st Century people come together over beverages and tasty treats. Thus began the journey of transforming the Old Moravian Book and Gift Shop into Lot 63: a coffee shop with fresh baked goods by Wilkerson Moravian Baking Company during the day and a taproom at night with a private label beer, local wine, German style soft pretzels and Moravian cookies.

The space will have a comfortable seating area of couches, soft chairs, and custom handmade wooden tables as well as a plethora of plugs for college students, professionals and old friends who need a space to study, work, and converse. In the back there will be a large community table and an alcove for private meetings.

Lot 63 also provides opportunities to host events, bring in speakers, and create space for dialogue. Additionally, there will be retail space in the basement where Moravian inspired goods and food curated by the Wilkerson Moravian Baking Company will be sold.

With one of the best outdoor seating areas in the Triad, Lot 63 will not be confined by its walls. With sidewalk, courtyard, and a lower-level beer and wine garden which includes a stage, this space will surely provide one of the most beautiful and enjoyable backdrops for people in the city.

You may be wondering: Lot 63? Where does the name come from? Well, when Old Salem was first established, each parcel (Lot) was given a number. For instance, Single Sisters was Lot 15. The School was Lot 16. Single Brothers across the square was Lot 62. And next door to that was "Store Lot 63."

Renovations are underway with an estimated opening later this fall.
