Meet Your New Board Members!

Heading into 2024, we want to welcome and introduce your new Board directors who will serve their first term until the end of 2027.

Ulrike Wiethaus is Professor Emerita, Department for the Study of Religions and American Ethnic Studies from Wake Forest University. She earned her Masters and Ph.D in Religious Studies from Temple University in 1982 and 1986 respectively. Having authored several previous books, she recently released her newest publication, "American Moravians and Their Neighbors, 1722-1822", a collaboration with Grant McAllister, David Bergstone and others. A native of Germany, Ulrike holds a natural affinity for Moravian studies and will be our keynote speaker for the WHS Annual Meeting in October, 2024.

Jackson Marshall, a native of Forsyth County, is newly retired as the Deputy Director of the North Carolina Museum of History in Raleigh, NC . Beginning in the administration in 1987, he directed his staff in collection curation and historical research for the Museum. Having earned his M.A. in history from Wake Forest University in 1985, Jackson has also served as an Adjunct Professor at the College of Southeastern in Wake Forest, NC from 2015 to 2023. In 1986, Jackson worked as a project assistant at Bethabara Historic Park and with the planning of the Old Salem Visitors Center.

An addition to the WHS Advisory Board is Evan Davis, who currently serves as the Director of the Farmland Preservation Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture where he has been employed since 2012. Evan graduated with a B.A. in Political Science with a Minor in history from Elon University in 2011 and earned two M.A.s in Public Administration and Project Administration from Western Carolina University and UNC. As a native of Wallburg, NC, Evan holds a life-long knowledge of the Wachovia tract and its history.

WHS is most fortunate to have these stellar individuals on board and we look forward to working with them over the next few years! Presentation of the 2024
Archie K. Davis Award

Moravian Americans and their Neighbors, 1772-1822

The keynote will offer an interdisciplinary examination of Moravian Americanization in the Early Republic. The lecture is based on a recently published landmark volume by the same title (Leiden and Boston: Brill 2023), which has brought together sixteen local, national, and international scholars. Themes include Moravian culture and the arts, religion and social issues, and Moravian holidays.

The presenters are the editors of the volume. Dr. Ulrike Wiethaus is Professor Emerita at Wake Forest University, Department for the Study of Religions, and a member of the Wachovia Historical Society for many years. Dr. Grant McAllister, Jr. is an associate professor of German literature and a Levison Faculty Fellow at Wake Forest University.

Tom Gray 2024 Receives Archie K Davis Award

This year's recipient of the award, Thomas A. Gray, was born into a family for whom service to museums and preservation organizations and the appreciation and conservation of material culture was not only encouraged, but expected. He received his under graduate degree from Duke University and a master's degree in early American culture from the Winterthur program at the University of Delaware. He then served at the director of the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts at Old Salem.

Tom's dedication to the success of Old Salem and MESDA has always been significant. After serving on the staff, he served on the Board of Trustees for 30 years. For three of those years he was the chairman. He has also served as the President and founder of the Historic Preservation Fund of North Carolina, a Trustee of the NC Museum of Arts, and a Board member of the Decorative Arts Trust. His devotion to preservation causes in North Carolina earned him the highest award in preservation in North Carolina, the Ruth Coltrane Cannon Award, in 1983.

With his mother, another ardent supporter of Old Salem and MESDA, Tom co-founded the Old Salem Toy Museum in 2002. The Museum was regarded as one of the most important exhibitions of its type with toys representing 1700 years of childhood with the German toys so well known by the Moravians as the centerpiece. Accompanying this amazing collection was a series of publications including the recipient's book, *The Old Salem Toy Museum*. The sharing of this amazing collection in the form of the Toy Museum prompted the governor of North Carolina to honor Tom with the State of North Carolina's highest civilian award, the order of the Long Leaf Pine, in 2002.

When the Toy Museum closed in 2010, Tom created endowed purchase funds for Old Salem and MESDA with the proceeds from the auction of the toys. The establishment of that fund has been transformative for the care and collecting of Moravian objects.

With the closing of the Old Salem Toy Museum, our recipient turned his attention to filling another conspicuous need of Old Salem and MESDA. Tom saw the need for a fully renovated library and research center and took up the mantle of making it happen. As icing on the cake, he created a special space where his rare book collection could be housed and made accessible to scholars of southern regional history and decorative arts.

In recognition of his many generous philanthropic endeavors that have benefitted Old Salem throughout the years, in 2012 the Old Salem Board of trustees awarded our recipient with the Frederick Williams Marshall Award.

In recognition of Tom's receipt of the Archie K. Davis Award, the children of Archie K. Davis sent the following message: *"As the children of Archie K. Davis, we congratulate our cousin Tom Gray, and we are so pleased that his efforts on behalf of Old Salem are being recognized with this award. Our father was a life-long student of history, and particularly as it related to Old Salem and the history of the Moravian Church. He would be so pleased with this presentation."*

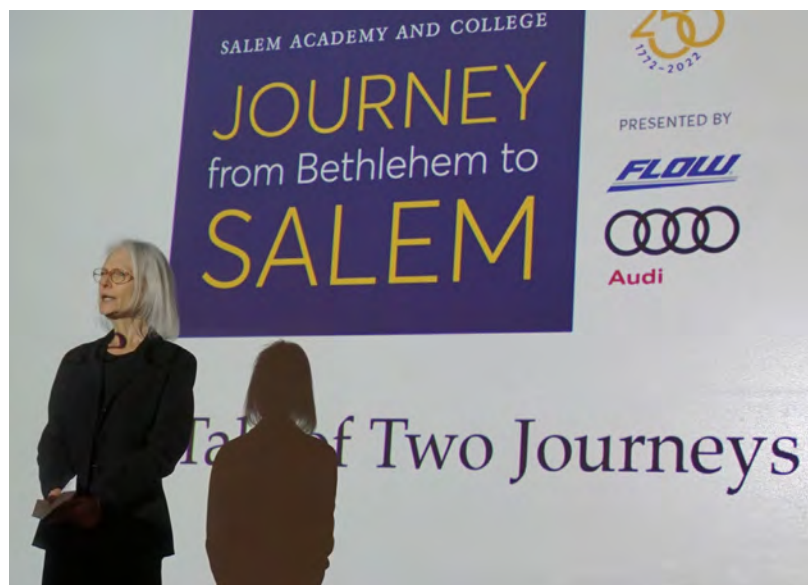

Maria (Polly) Steiner Wachovia Collection

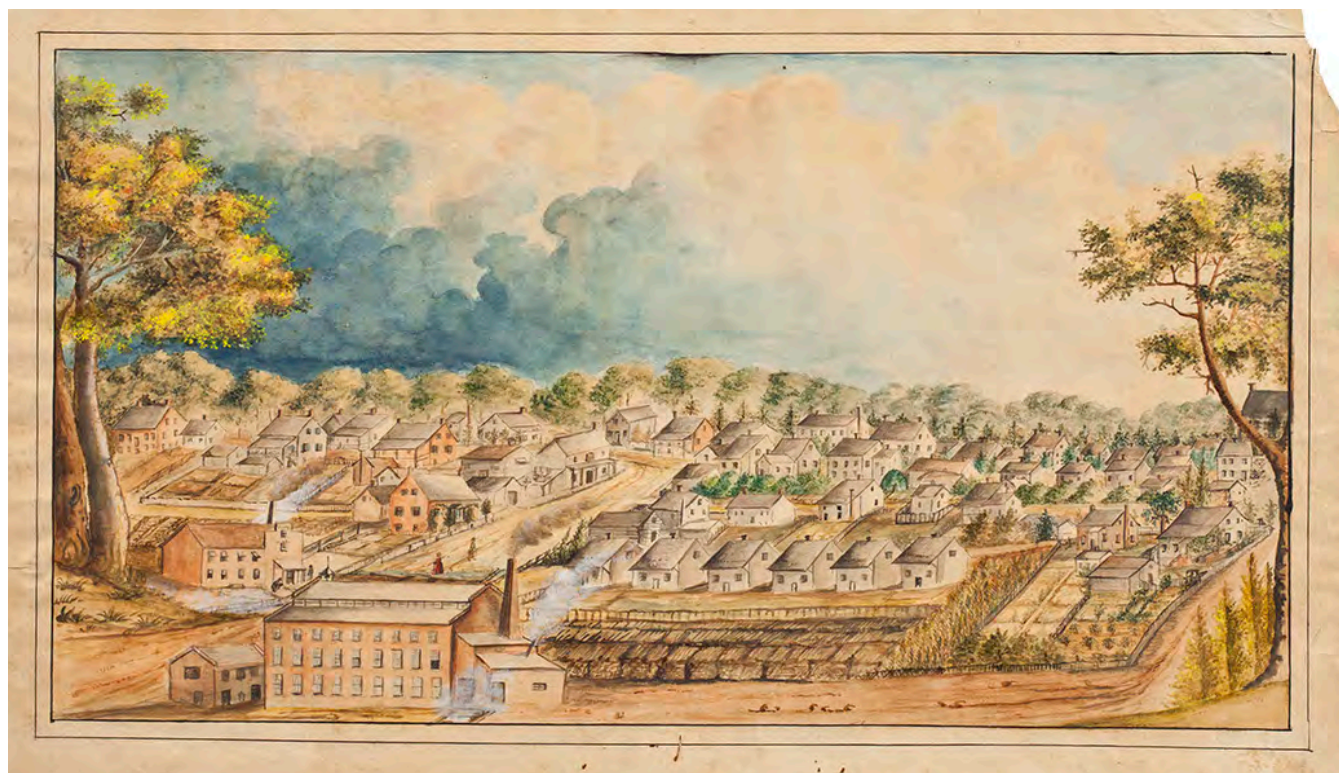
Mary (Maria) “Polly” Steiner Denke

She had indeed rare tact and ability in dealing with young people. Hers was the happy faculty possessed by so few of knowing when to keep silence and when to speak. Joined to the intuitive perception of a woman, she had a logical way of arriving at conclusions. At the proper time she would press her views home with convincing power...

(Memoir of the Widowed Sister, Mary Denke, November 27, 1868)

North Carolina Moravian History is punctuated with the stories of strong women who made significant contributions to the founding and operation of Moravian communities. Salem resident Maria Steiner Denke (1792-1868) was one of these women.

As the oldest daughter of Abraham and Christina Fisher Steiner, Maria (also called Mary and Polly) was born in Bethabara but moved to Salem to live with an aunt and uncle at just six years old when her parents left Wachovia to serve as missionaries. Maria was one of the first local girls to attend the Salem Girls' Boarding School when it opened its doors

in 1804. Maria and another Salem resident, Anna Paulina Schober, were carefully chosen from among the Moravian girls in the town school to attend the newly established boarding school with students from outside the community to help the newcomers adjust to the customs and practices of the Moravian community. From an early age, Maria Steiner was a leader and a mentor.

Once she completed her studies as a student, Maria Steiner joined the faculty at the Salem Girls' Boarding School in 1811 where she continued to serve as a much beloved teacher intermittently for more than 50 years. In 1820 Steiner was appointed leader or *Pflegerin* of the Single Sisters' Choir in Salem. As the leader of the Choir, she was also a member of the Elders' Conference.

Maria lived a life of service to the Church and to the community in which she lived, but she was not one to be pressured to do things she did not want to do. In 1823 when the Elders' Conference suggested she was duty bound to give up plans for a recreational trip to Bethlehem with several other members of the community because of her leadership role, she agreed to give up the office rather than abandon her plans to travel. Apparently her refusal to change her plans did not actually result in her dismissal from the position of *Pflegerin* as the records indicate she still held the office in March 1824. Perhaps this was an instance in which she was able to ultimately "press her views home with convincing power."

Even as the leader of the Single Sisters' Choir, Maria continued to teach in the school. She also taught music lessons to a young woman (not a student at the school) who was boarding in the home of John Vogler. Her insistence on teaching the young "Miss Kerr" without the permission of the Church leadership was a cause of great annoyance to the body.

Maria also contributed to the education of African Americans in Salem. She was a founding member of the Women's Missionary Society and served as secretary beginning in 1823. Educating the African American members of the Salem community was one of Maria's life-long pursuits. As noted in her memoir...

For a number of years alone, at times assisted by others, she... attended the African Church, and {gave} religious instruction to such colored people as were willing to avail themselves of the privilege.

Maria Steiner was a born educator. In 1828 at the age of 36 she married Christian Friedrich Denke (1775-1838), but unlike most young Moravian women who gave up the occupations they participated in as Single Sisters, Maria continued to teach when she was able until nearly the end of her life.

Maria Steiner Denke was a well-respected leader and a gifted teacher. Although she had no children of her own, she educated generations of Salem's female residents and the daughters of many prominent families whose parents and guardians depended on the Moravians to educate and care for their children.

Maria was also an artist and a musician. As a student of only ten years old she completed the Dresden work sampler you see here. Later in her life, she probably painted this important watercolor view of Salem that we continue to use as a primary document when studying changes in the landscape of Salem over time including the prominent illustration of the cotton and woolen mills that dominated the western edge of the town of Salem by the 1840's.

Maria Steiner was a well-educated, artistic, and talented woman who was beloved by her students and the Salem community and made an important impact on both.

Update on the Adam & Maria Spach Park - Phase 2

The receipt of the \$250,000 grant from the State of North Carolina has signaled the green light for moving forward with the Adam & Maria Historic Park construction. The next important step is the ground penetrating radar (GPR) for which WHS has contracted with Seramur & Associates from Boone, NC, a geophysical survey company. Seramur & Associates will survey the park site to identify locations of previous ancillary buildings (barns, privies, brick floors) to the Adam & Maria Spach farm and for any anomalies that would signify possible underground objects.

Upon completion of the GPR survey, engineered drawings will be prepared for the grading and surfacing of the right-of-way, the parking area and the Spach monument area. These drawings will also include erosion control measures needed. The site will then be cleared of dead and dying trees and undergrowth so that construction can begin.

As in any project of this type, there can be delays and setbacks beyond our control and that is why we are now projecting a completion date sometime in the latter part of 2025. Our state grant requires that we utilize the funds received by October, 2025, and we are striving to meet that goal.

Our thanks to all of our constituents who have contributed to the Adam & Maria Spach fund and the sale of memorial/honorarium bricks that have contributed over \$7,000 in additional funds.
